WHL receives \$5.2m state government funding to build homes for women escaping family violence

WHL this week received 5.2 million funding from the Victorian Government towards the construction of 24 new apartments (8 x 1-bedroom and 16 x 2-bedroom) on WHL-owned land in Bayswater for women with or without children who are escaping family violence.

Ending Family Violence – Victoria's plan for change identified a number of key priorities to assist women and children to secure safe and stable housing.

WHL – in collaboration with women's refuges Georgina Martina, Safe Futures Foundation, Kara House Inc. and Emerge Women's and Children's Support Network – plan to directly address these priorities by helping women and children living in family violence environments to move into secure medium-term housing.

"Our housing and homelessness investments will help more than 19,000 Victorians to access and sustain housing - but we know there's still more to do...we're working to build safe and inclusive communities." – Martin Foley MP, Minister for Housing

Critically, the planned development will be underpinned by an innovative service model that helps women trapped in violent environments to escape *before* a crisis point is reached, and provides them and their children with a pathway into sustainable accommodation where they also receive the support they need to rebuild their lives.

WHL believe that the new development and the support model will divert a significant number of women from our overstretched refuge and homelessness services and reduce many associated traumas (and their long-term consequences for both the individuals and government budgets).

100% of the new accommodation will be made available to FV families

- 75% of the total will be made available to those eligible for public housing
- The remaining 25% will be made available to those on low incomes.
